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
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2025 CONVENTION RULES OF ORDER

- 1. The convention program shall be the order of business for its meetings. However, to expedite the session proceedings or to accommodate guest speakers, the president may make changes for that session.
- 2. For admission to the convention hall and to facilitate identification and seating, delegates and others shall be required to wear the badge issued upon registration.
- 3. In the convention hall, there shall be no use of electronic voice applications or talking on cell phones, unless expressly authorized. Texting is permitted as long as the device is set to mute or vibrate. Unauthorized videotaping, recording or transmission of the convention proceedings is prohibited. Cell phones shall be turned off or set to vibrate.

DEBATE

- 4. Before a delegate can make a motion or address the convention, the delegate must be recognized by the presiding officer. Upon recognition, the delegate must address the presiding officer by their title, (for example, "Madame President," "Madame Chairwoman," etc.) stating that "I am" and his/her name, "delegate from" and provide the district number the delegate represents.
- 5. A person who has been recognized to make a motion or to debate may not use the floor for a different purpose.
- 6. No delegate shall speak in debate more than twice on the same question on the same day, or longer than two minutes each time, without permission of the assembly granted by a majority vote without debate.
- 7. Total debate on any main motion and pending secondary motions, including amendments, shall not exceed a total of 20 minutes unless permission is granted by the assembly. Ten minute increments may be granted by a majority vote without debate.
- 8. Debate on a motion shall not be closed unless both sides have been given the opportunity to speak.

BUSINESS

- 9. Policy platform objectives receiving an unfavorable report from the statewide Policy Platform Committee shall not be considered during regular business. However, such objectives may be considered under new business pursuant to Rule 11.
- 10. Business items not in the convention program which a delegate wishes to be considered, must be submitted to the president in writing or via email to convention@seanc.org by **9 a.m. on Friday, September 5, 2025.**
- 11. A substantive amendment to any item of business must be submitted either in writing to the president or via email to convention@seanc.org.
- 12. Voting for delegates will be conducted by individual electronic keypads. Delegates in the convention hall will use electronic keypads to vote. Voting results will appear on the large screen in front of the convention hall.
- 13. Only one vote per delegate may be cast in an election. If in any election the total number of votes cast by a district or region exceeds its number of eligible voters, that district or region alone shall vote again after remedial steps are taken to prevent an excess of votes.
- 14. Amendments to the EMPAC Bylaws must be submitted in writing to the state EMPAC Chairperson or via email to convention@seanc.org by **9 a.m. on Friday, September 5, 2025,** to be considered.
